Message from Interim Pastor John Kuziej

We need protection. Jesus understood and in the 17th chapter of the Gospel of John we hear Jesus at prayer. Originally Jesus prayed for his disciples, that small band Jesus prepared for continuing his work once he ascended into heaven. But later Jesus made it clear that he was praying for the church for all time. We hear Jesus pray, "Holy Father, protect them in your name that you have given me, so that they be one, as we are one." Jesus does not want his church to retreat into comfort and complacency. Jesus sends his church into the world to continue his work of proclaiming God's love for the world, and God's will that people find life, eternal life, by faith in Jesus.

The church will face opposition in the world; Jesus even warned that the world will hate the followers of Jesus, because the church does not belong to the world. In the gospel of John, 'world' does not mean 'earth'. It means opposition to the will of God. Jesus also prayed heavenly protection from the 'evil one'. In the gospel of John, the Evil One, Satan, is one who deceives, lies, and wills to destroy faith in God.

In the gospels we read of Jesus' first disciples arguing among themselves as to who is the greatest. The brothers James and John even sent their mother to lobby Jesus for seats of honor, glory, and power. Jesus told them they are behaving just like the power-hungry in the world. Instead, they are to remember who they are following, Jesus! Jesus said that he came not to be served and step over others for greatness. Jesus came to serve, even to giving up his life for our salvation.

Those first disciples sounded so crass claiming greatness over others; the church today would not be so clueless. But the church can be tempted to seek worldly praise by looking at other churches as competition. Churches can be prideful thinking 'look how much more faithful and correct we are with our theology than other churches.' The church is not in competition with the other churches in town. Turn to the cross and remember Jesus has won the victory, Jesus is our salvation. Listen to Jesus who prays that his followers be one. This is a prayer for unity. There are different denominations, but in Jesus there is unity as we respect one another and seek opportunities to work together furthering the good news of Jesus.

People may say the church must avoid politics like the plague. Certainly, in a contentious and crazy election year, the church is not to be an appendage to any political party. But the church, with its ministry of following Jesus, must be faithful to goals which enhance life and protect creation, encourage compassion, and demand justice or fairness for people who have been shoved aside by ideologies of inequality and discrimination.

Many times, I have heard members of congregations worry about numbers, meaning low attendance, or concern about finances. Instead, may the church be on guard against being numb to the suffering in the world. Many recall Jesus' parable of the last judgment. Those who do the will of Jesus are those who have the heart of Jesus: "I was hungry, and you gave me food. I was thirsty and you gave me a drink, I was naked, and you clothed me, I was in prison, and you visited me, I was sick, and you took care of me." For when you minister to the least of these, knowing the urgency of need, you do so for Jesus and will experience his joy in serving.

Jesus' intercession on behalf of us, his beloved church, is necessary because of who is in the church. Sinners. Over the years the church has supported terrible institutions like slavery. Today the church can forgo the cross and pursue policies that deny for others the expansive welcome of the love of God. It can be easy to complain about the world and ignore our hypocrisy and lack of humility. We understand how important Jesus' prayer for our protection is: as Luther would say from the world, the devil, and our own sinful selves. Jesus prayed that we be protected by the name of God. The name means the full character of God. God is our refuge because God is love, and God loves the world, just ask Jesus!

May we understand our faith is rooted and protected by the faithfulness of God: "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. By his great mercy we have been given a new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, and to an inheritance...kept in heaven for you, who are being protected by the power of God through faith for a salvation ready to be revealed in the last time." (1 Peter 1: 3-5).

We can look at what is going on in the world and either shake with fear or stand confident on the promise of Jesus' prayer for the protection of the church. The apostle Paul knew all sorts of opposition to his ministry of sharing the gospel. But instead of tendering his resignation, Paul wrote for himself and the church today: "Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God, and the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus"--Jesus who is praying for us!

Opening

JoAnne Barrix opened the hybrid meeting at 6:01 pm.

Devotion by Darlene "Franciscan Prayer"

Action – Motion/Second/Carried...Approved the minutes from the March 14, 2024 meeting. Unanimous.

Pastor's Report:

- 1. We have coverage for Sundays and continue to look for other assistance.
- 2. Synod Assembly looking to celebrate the 50 th year of ELCA World Hunger (website https://www.elca.org/wh50) Asking congregations to think of creative ways to fundraise money. After discussion, decided to have a "Noisy Offering" with youth ushers asking for change in metal containers every Sunday until assembly. How LOUD can we make our offering? Pastor John will take proceeds to the Assembly.
- 3. Baptism this Sunday, April 14th and June 9th.

Long-Term Items:

- 1. Workship: discuss effectiveness and quality: (3X/year).
 - a. Nursing/Senior Living services going great with membership participation. All are welcome.
 - b. Easter went well.
- 2. Administer and oversee financial affairs and budget: (quarterly). Brian researching ways to collect interest on part of our general fund (using \$60,000 of \$104,000).
- 3. Procure and insure proper insurance: (annually). Currently well covered.

Short-Term Items:

Old Business:

- 1. Facilities Update:
 - a. Our contractor for the roof is still slated for sometime in July or August. John is in contact and will keep us updated on any changes.
 - b. Gene and John worked on the 5-year plan. The next step is working with Brian on the budget. When completed will present to Stewardship & Council to prioritize.
 - c. Painting continues.
 - d. Depending on nature, hope to shut down the boiler soon.
- 2. Call committee Update: No new updates. Continue prayers!
- 3. Love Rhinelander: no updates at this time. Will keep you posted.
- 4. Synod Assembly Hybrid meeting is Saturday, May 18th at Ascension Lutheran in Minocqua. Must register by April 12th. JoAnne volunteered, but we need one more delegate, preferably a male.

5. Faith Explorers needs our help to educate our wonderful children and grow their faith. There are multiple ways to volunteer and scheduling is flexible. Training and working with your personal preferences provided. Please contact Becky Eades or Sarah Willoughby for more details.

New Business:

- Child protection Policy: Currently we do have a policy, but not as in depth as the Northern Great Lakes Synod. One of the differences is background checks and the cost. The Youth and Education Committee has asked the Council to review the synod policy and adopt (website https://nglsynod.org/?s= Child+protection+policy). Council has agreed to review, and make a decision at the next Council Committee meeting May 8th.
- 2. Fortune Lake Annual Meeting is April 28th . Cory Dellenbach had agreed to attend and be our delegate.
- 3. We received a letter from the Synod regarding a Temple talk from a Mission Interpreter. JoAnne had agreed to check into this so we can set up a Sunday.

Comments and Committee Actions:

1. STEWARDSHIP: Some of the endowment fund was used for the roof repair, but there is money left that would like to be used for expanding our ministries. Please work with your committees to see how we can grow by using this available funding.



EQUITY CHALLENGE

NORTHWEST TERRITORY

"If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, God is faithful and just and cleanses us from all unrighteousness." 1 John 1:8-10

"Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God." Matthew 5:8

"...putting away all falsehood, let us speak the truth to our neighbors, for we are members of one another." Ephesians 4:25

This month's challenge continues the focus on our relationships with Indian Nations and how we came to live on the land we call home. The Treaty of Paris of 1783 that ended the Revolutionary War required the British to disavow any claims to the current states of Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, and Wisconsin — the Northwest Territory. Here are the treaties that ceded land where the Ojibwe [Anglicized to "Chippewa"] lived in Wisconsin:

Treaty of Saint Peters, 1837: parts of Wisconsin with retentions of hunting, fishing, and gathering rights on the ceded land.


Treaty of La Pointe, 1842: Upper Peninsula of Michigan and parts of Wisconsin with the Ojibwe retaining hunting rights <u>"at the pleasure of the President of the United States."</u>

Second Treaty of La Pointe, 1854: ceded part of Wisconsin.

Each treaty took more land from our Indigenous sisters and brothers in exchange for annual annuities, often paid late or not at all. I wonder what Wisconsin would look like today if we, as a nation, had honored each of those agreements? Would the 31,000 members of tribes retain most of the land and would 4-1/2 million whites, including me, be concentrated in reservations?

Some churches have chosen to recognize our dishonesty in respecting treaties by choosing to adopt "land acknowledgements". These statements name the Indian Nations who preserved the lands where we live and commit us to restoring relationships we severed, and to preserving the land for our great-great-great-great-great grandchildren as they did. Following this path, we can move toward restoring our relationships with the land, our Native Neighbors, and our God.

.....This is Stewardship!


