Message from Interim Pastor John Kuziej

In the course of a day, things people say to me prompt ideas for sermons or newsletter articles. Once a month I visit a dear saint in her assisted living facility. At mealtimes she always prays a table grace to herself. She does not pray aloud so not to disturb the three others at the table. She simply bows her head in silent prayer. But even this simple way of prayer attracted attention. A lady at the table was curious and wanted to know why she bowed her head before she began eating. She responded that she was giving thanks to God for the meal. She felt she was considered odd for doing so. Later she told me she has a regular habit of daily prayer. Not only does she pray at meals, but she also prays at the beginning of the day and before she goes to bed. She told me about explaining her prayer routine to her agnostic grandson. She prays to thank God for the gift of each day. Gratitude guides her prayers.

Instead of each day being a blur of business, prayers of gratitude to God clarifies our vision. In the psalms we hear, "Give thanks to the Lord for his mercy endures forever." Mercy reminds us that God is for us and not against us. God's love is greater than whatever is against us, enabling us to live each day with faith in God's guidance. On Pentecost Sunday we heard a scripture text that said we are not to be enslaved to fear. This is not an impossible demand to be never afraid. We can be afraid of what Martin Luther called sin, death and the power of the devil (evil). If we are enslaved to fear, we feel powerless. The Holy Spirit is ever at work beside us to make clear to our spirits that we are the precious children of God. The Holy Spirit brings to mind the love of Jesus and his words that teach us faith, hope, and love. Let us ever be thankful to Jesus: thank you Jesus for overcoming the power of sin with forgiveness. Thank you, Jesus for defeating the power of death with the gift of eternal life. Thank you, Jesus, for giving us the Kingdom, the promise of a new creation where evil is gone for good.

The other day at the café, the waitress came round to refill my coffee cup. Usually this is done without words, but not this time. She told me, "I have resolved to avoid negative people." We can sympathize. It can be depressing to listen to people who complain and find fault with the world. I think, however, we must not judge too quickly or harshly. People who say negative things are not by themselves negative in the eyes of God. God, who knows the heart understands the fear and trouble that may cause complaints and blame. We cannot solve the problems of others, but we can help them work through them with an attitude of empathy. The gospel reading for Pentecost Sunday was a promise from Jesus. Jesus said, "But the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything and remind you of all that I have said to you." If we are bothered by negative people, we can pray for them. And we can ask

Jesus to teach us and help us not to criticize but instead seek to encourage, console, and build up one another. Right after Jesus spoke of the Holy Spirit for the life and mission of the church, he said, "Peace I leave with you. My peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid."


Negative people need peace. Let us pray that we can be instruments of God's peace. In the first letter of Peter, the apostle is teaching us not to avoid difficult people, but to witness God's grace and mercy. The apostle said, "do not be intimidated or fear what they fear". We do not want to be drawn into fear and start complaining ourselves just how terrible everything is. But instead, the apostle Peter wrote, "Always be ready to make your defense to anyone who demands from you an accounting of the hope that is in you yet do so with gentleness and reverence." May the hope we share of the unbreakable love of Jesus help lift people from fear to faith.

David French is a columnist for the New York Times. In a recent column he wrote: "America has always been a country with lots of Christian citizens, but it has not always behaved like a Christian country....an old error is new. Too many Christians are transforming Christianity into a vertical faith, one that focuses on your personal relationship with God at the expense of the horizontal relationship you have with your neighbors." Our faith is cross shaped. God sent his Son, Jesus, to reveal love for the world. This love shown by Jesus and his mission not to condemn the world, but to save it. We trust Jesus and are thankful for his gift of salvation by grace. We are drawn to the cross to be saved, thankful for a relationship with Jesus who never abandons us. The Savior also calls us to love one another. This is what Jesus taught when he washed the disciples' feet. He told them and us, that we are to wash one another's feet. This is the call for humble service: speak the encouraging word, let us be a church of empathy understanding God's love and mercy for all people. Let us continue to feed the hungry, welcome the refugee, minister to the sick, clothe the naked, and see others as brothers and sisters for whom Jesus died on the cross to save. Let us pray to be a people of gratitude for God's gift of life. Let us be thankful to Jesus who has raised us up to be a people of empathy. Be thankful for the Holy Spirit, who is ever at work teaching the church the words of Jesus. The main word is love; as Jesus said, people will know you are my disciples by your love for one another.

Call to Order 6:00pm

Devotion: Bill

Action: Motion/2nd/Carried...Approve Meeting Minutes from April 9, 2025. Unanimous

Pastors Report: Pastor will be gone May 25 and July 27. Others will be contacted to preach those days. There is a baptism coming up but no date has been set. Pastor's home phone is listed on the church message system and he has been getting calls that should be going to the ACES on call coordinator when people need financial assistance. The message system will be changed to direct those calls to the ACES coordinator.

Long Term:

- 1. Make disciples: Teach and Baptize (3 times per year) regular outreach to members and visitors and community activities will continue.
- 2. Staff evaluate, support, and maintain relationships (semi-annually) Staff relationships are good and nothing is needed at this time.
- 3. Review membership roster (annually) discussed the membership roster with people who may have moved but still want to be on the roster and those that haven't transferred to another church. No action will be taken at this time to change the roster until a new pastor is hired.

Old Business:

- 1. Audio/Visual Equipment Project Update: we don't have a quote yet, but Stewardship committee approved the purchase a new mic and possibly repair the old mic with a total cost of about \$350.
- 2. Fire Department and emergency egress plan: A video is being developed with an evacuation plan and will be reviewed at a later date.
- 3. Call Committee Update: Corey presented an updated church profile. Items in the profile were reviewed by the council and discussed and updated to reflect the activities of the church, living conditions of the area, and the makeup of the congregation and what we expect of a new pastor. Profile was approved and will be sent to synod.

4. Committee updates:

a. The church constitution committee has reviewed the constitution regarding the updates, changes, and clarifications that are needed. The church does not need to be incorporated since it falls into the religious society category. A definition of inactive members was established. Clarification of our endowment fund operation was made. The term of our church treasurer was clarified as a non-elected position so it does

not have a time limit on appointment. A congregational meeting to approve the changes is needed and will be posted soon.

- b. The Stewardship committee indicated that a loose offering for June, July and August be directed to ACES. The synod meeting is the May 16 weekend and the Mladucky's will attend as our representatives and will present our collection of \$950 for the world hunger offering.
- c. Facilities update: The parking lot was cleaned. The boilers will be left on for another week or so since cold weather is expected but will be shut off soon.
- d. Garden group: the 5 year plan authorized the replacement of landscaping timbers. Other landscaping is desired and additional plants and soil are needed. A cost proposal will be made to the Stewardship committee. Some soil and plants have been purchased and this will be coordinated with facilities committee.
- e. More large print bulletins will be printed for the service.

New Business

- 1. Offering envelopes. There are a number of offering envelopes at the back of the church that have never been picked up. Some members may be giving on line or by mail and are still encouraged to pick up the envelopes since it is expensive to mail them.
- 2. Pictures of church council members: new pictures are needed for the bulletin board by the entrance.
- 3. Summer picnic: construction in Pioneer Park and Hodag park has complicated picnic decisions. Outreach committee will follow up on dates for the picnic.

And a voice came out of the cloud, saying, "This is my beloved Son; Listen to Him. Love one another as I have loved you." Luke 9:35. "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. John 13:34.

Attending worship, reading the Bible, and praying are some ways we listen to God, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit, learning how to love one another. We also learn through the stories authors write to expand our views, to be entertained, and to bring us together as companions in our pilgrimage as Christians. Here are some summer reading recommendations to help us grow in faith.

"How Not to Get Shot" by D. L. Hughley

In a satirical, funny review of white advice on encounters with police, Huglhey lays bare the realities faced by our non-white brothers and sisters. The book is an easy read and may leave you laughing and crying.

"Horse" by Geraldine Brooks

This "can't put it down" novel weaves together the stories of a racehorse, Lexington; his enslaved groom, Jarret; and a young painter of horses, Thomas J. Scott, across different time periods. The novel also follows the lives of Jess, a Smithsonian scientist, and Theo, an art history student, in modern-day Washington, D.C., as they investigate the horse's legacy. Ultimately, the story explores the complexities of slavery, racism, and the lasting impact of history on individuals and society. Based on true events.

"James" by Percival Everett

Teetering between unspeakable terror and knockout comedy, this story reimagines the Adventures of Huckleberry Finn told from the enslaved Jim's point of view. Reading Huck Finn first helps understand the book.

"Killers of the Flower Moon: The Osage Murders and the Birth of the FBI" by David Grann The discovery of oil on the Osage Reservation led to tribal members becoming the richest people in the country through their head rights that divided the profits to individual tribal members. The book tells the story of tribal member, Molly Burkhardt, and the mysterious murders of her family members from whom she inherited headrights. Circumstances bring in the U. S. Bureau of Investigation when she becomes deathly ill. In 2023, Martin Scorsese made the book a movie that received 10 Oscar nominations.

All these books are available at the Rhinelander District Library in various formats.
