Message from Interim Pastor John Kuziej

As the calendar turned to October, we can be sure the season of Fall is firmly in place. The colorful leaves are beginning to drop; frost is prevalent, and the flowerpots and beds need to be cleaned. Churches are encouraged to decorate with pumpkins and gourds. At home we may want to change to flannel sheets and bring out an extra quilt. It is time to attend the Fortune Lake Fall Fest, October 5th. There is a Continental Breakfast and Bake Sale (stock up on Cardamon bread). The highlight of the day is the annual quilt auction, a major fundraiser for the Camp.

There are dates on the Church Calendar that may have us ponder current events. October 4th is the Commemoration of St. Francis, a renewer of the church who lived in the 13th century. There is an Episcopal Church in Eagle River that has the name of this saint. You come into the church and see a large painting of St. Francis surrounded by birds and animals. Because of his respect for all God's creatures, some churches have a "Pet Blessing" service. You bring to church (outside) your pets—dogs, cats, birds, snakes, turtles, horses, and the list goes on. It is time to be thankful for the comfort and joy our pets provide. From a book with the title, "All Dogs are Good", there is a poet that reminds us that dogs can be good teachers. A portion of the poem reads, "My dog teaches me to live every day with love, A sad moment can be fixed with a hug and a face that knows, and following your heart is as good as following your nose."

I have attended worship at St. Francis Episcopal. A neat thing they do at every worship is recite the Prayer of St. Francis. This familiar prayer begins: "Lord, make us instruments of your peace. Where there is hatred, let us sow love, where there is injury, pardon; where there is discord, union; where there is doubt, faith; where there is despair, hope; where there is darkness, light; where there is sadness, joy." In this election time when it seems words of hatred and hostility pollute the air, it would be good to pray the St. Francis prayer often. (Suggestion: If you come to Sunday worship early, peruse a section of prayers in the hymnal, page 72-87; plenty of good food for thought).

October 14 is Indigenous Peoples' Day. Years ago, when I was a pastor in Saskatchewan, I lived in an area surrounded by five Indian reservations. In Canada, Indians are referred to as "First Nations". Driving home from a town where I served a congregation, an Indian man was hitch-hiking. I said I could take him as far as my town. When I came home, it was dark, and I thought I could not drop him off on the road when it was night. So, I drove an extra hour to his destination. Before we arrived, we stopped at a restaurant, and I bought him dinner. This may seem foolish to go out of my way for a stranger. But it was not a loss of a few dollars. We were in conversation, and I learned about his life. This is the way to overcome stereotypes and fear. By the way, at the upcoming Synod Resource Fair at Bethel Lutheran in Ishpeming, MI there is a workshop, "Walking with Our Indigenous Neighbors". The date is Saturday, October 19, beginning at 9:30 (eastern time). The cost is \$25 which includes other workshops, lunch, and a copy of hymnal, "All Creation Sings".

October 16th is World Food Day. The theme for this year is "Right to foods for a better life and a better future." A common table grace prays thanksgiving for the food we are about to eat, but also "Bless be God, who is our bread, may all the world be clothed and fed". Immanuel Lutheran has been helpful with local food needs with members volunteering at the Food Pantry and preparing a monthly meal at Frederick Place.

When we come to October 31st, the first thing that comes to mind is Halloween. We love to see small children dress up with their costumes. When I was in the U. P., the local veterinarian for years asked to borrow a clergy shirt for his costume. He was going to party dressed as a pastor/priest--spooky stuff! I heard on the radio that spending for Halloween has sky-rocketed. Last year 12 billion dollars was spent in this country on all the stuff dealing with Halloween—candy and costumes, parties and pranks. Halloween is good business, but what about the business of helping the hungry and poor?

For us Lutheran folk, October 31 is a day of special remembrance. On that day in 1517 Martin Luther, a priest and professor, posted what is known as the 95 Theses. He wanted to debate church practices of the time he felt were harmful to a person's faith and salvation. Churches like to sell things and raise money, but Luther wanted it clear that no one should ever get the notion that God's grace is for sale. Instead of buying what was called an indulgence promising certain benefits, it is far more beneficial to use resources to help the poor. Acts of love beget more deeds of love for the benefit of one's neighbor. Luther wrote that the true treasure of the church is not a rich bank account, but the "most holy gospel of the glory and grace of God." Reformation Sunday (October 27) does not mean Lutheran boasting, but the blessing of the gospel, that our salvation is by grace, received by faith. As Lutheran Christians we pray for the Spirit's reforming grace: that Jesus is ever at the center, and that with him, we grow in faith and love for one another.

Shining with the Light of Christ in the Northern Great Lakes Synod

Dear People of the Northern Great Lakes Synod,

I have heard it said, "If nothing ever changed, there would be no butterflies." What I hear in this quote is the promise of better, the hope of beauty, and the surprise of blessing that can come from change.

Our world, our society, our climate, our culture, our Church – all are in the midst of change, transition, and maybe even transformation.

But we are not so keen on change. People like to sit in the same

pew, go to the same place for coffee, sit in the same place at the dinner table, observe traditions and rituals that give order, structure, and meaning to our days. Sure, we might rearrange the furniture or put up new curtains, but these changes are of our own making. We choose the change and we can change it back if we want to. It's when changes are imposed upon us that we may balk, resist, or resent what another has decided or how the flow has shifted.



No one decided that the Church or culture should change, but it has. And because I believe the Holy Spirit knows how much we resist change, we, as the Church, are being pushed in a direction that we would not go in willingly but is God's will nevertheless. So here we are, and already I see the promise of better, the hope of beauty and unexpected blessing.

In July, 27 lay people who provide preaching in their own and neighboring congregations met for a Preaching Seminar. The goal was to further equip them for the ministry they are already doing using their gifts in ways that perhaps would not happen if there were enough pastors to go around. These gifted, spirited, and conscientious leaders invested their time and effort to learn more in order to do better. Efforts will continue to support and equip lay leaders and preachers for the work of ministry alongside pastors and administrative interims.

I see congregations becoming more collaborative, partnering together with neighboring congregations for ministry and education, supporting each other, becoming more aware of each other, learning from each other.

I see us becoming more mindful of the work of the Holy Spirit in our midst. Our classes on spirituality, prayer, and discernment offered through Lifelong Faith Formation continue to be well attended. I see a heightened tolerance for discomfort as people

have the courage to engage in conversations around race, politics, gender issues, and more. More and more, people in our congregations are lowering their defenses to learn something new. Book studies, the Kaleidoscope Challenge, and study of ELCA social statements provide ongoing opportunities for deeper engagement and conversation concerning issues that do not have a sound bite answer.

I am proud of us for the innovation I see, the resilience, the adaptability, and the commitment to ministry and congregational life, even in the face of uncertainty and civil division.

Be aware that in our world, and in our congregations, anxiety can present as anger, negativity, and a desire to blame or demonize when really there is no one to blame. Change is simply happening. And our calling as disciples of Jesus is to respond in a way that is life giving, compassionate, and in alignment with Jesus' command to love God and neighbor.

Change is afoot...even in the Synod office.
Courtney Wehmeier, our Synod Office
Administrator for the last year, was accepted into a
graduate program in Leeds, England to pursue a
degree in Marketing Analytics. Her last day was in
July. Pastor Jim Duehring, our Assistant to the
Bishop and Director for Evangelical Mission for the
last seven years, has joined the ranks of the retired
as of August 31. As of this writing, the search for
new staff continues.

In the meantime, Betsy Koski, our Synod bookkeeper and fill-in-the-gap-gal, and myself will do our best to meet the demands of Synod ministry. And of course, in this staff transition, there is opportunity. Perhaps circumstances will necessitate inventing a new way of doing things. Perhaps we will be blessed with new staff that provide unique perspectives and a skill set that we didn't know we needed.

Whatever the future brings - in our country, in our world, in our congregations, in our synod, God is at work...in you and your community of faith.

Together, we will strive to respond to change in a way that proclaims that we are disciples of Jesus and children of God, united in mission and planting seeds for future hope, beauty, and blessing.
