Message from Interim Pastor John Kuziej

Many of us look forward to the Christmas Eve service. The service has familiar carols we enjoy singing. There may be special music. I still remember a service with the hymn “O Holy Night” sung with power and feeling by a high school student. Then with the lights dimmed and our candles lighted, we sing “Silent Night.” Christmas Eve may be the only service during the year when the sanctuary is filled. I have talked to older members who remember the Christmas Eve service at midnight. This was the first service to celebrate the birth of our Savior. On Christmas Day two more services could be scheduled, one quite early in the morning, and the second one later. But as we know, times change. Some churches, especially smaller congregations, do not have services on Christmas Day.

I have wonderful memories of Christmas Eve services with full sanctuaries, lots of kids, and beautiful music. My most memorable Christmas service had a considerably smaller number. The number in attendance was two. This was not a Christmas Eve service, but a service called “Blue Christmas”, scheduled the evening of the winter solstice, the day with the least amount of daylight. The days of darkness more than light can make us sad, especially in times of grief. One person showed up for the service. He was a friend of mine, and we shared a common sadness at Christmas; our wives had died years before. It was decided between us not to follow the prepared order of service. We left the sanctuary and found comfortable places to sit in the Fellowship Hall. We shared our feelings about a festive time of year without a deeply loved one. We talked about our hearts not in the mood for common Christmas customs of shopping for gifts and decorating the home. We shared memories of the past when our wives were alive. This was a Christmas service but without hymns and a sermon. It was a comfort to share sadness and affirm that was just as appropriate for Christmas as joy. The baby in the manger was God-in-the-flesh. Mary and Joseph were poor. The angels came to shepherds, hard-working men with no special status. Soon the Holy Family would be refugees fleeing a tyrant who feared Jesus, the newborn king, as a threat. As the gospel of John wrote, Jesus is the eternal God, who came to dwell among us. This ‘dwelling among us’ meant no privilege; the gospel of Matthew stated twice that Jesus came to this world to bear all our infirmity and all our grief.

I heard on the radio that leaders of the various Christians churches in Israel, and the Middle East, keep Christmas celebrations at a low key. It was not deemed appropriate during this time of war—war between Israel and Hamas—to have splashy decorations, processions and parties. This did not mean Christmas worship be cancelled but may worship emphasize compassion for the many families who are suffering the pains of loss. It does not matter whether one is Jewish, Muslim, or Christian. The Christmas gospel does not take sides. The Bible tells us that God loves this world. The Jewish scriptures, what we call the Old Testament, speaks of God as “slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love.” I do not know

the teachings of Islam, but Muslims often pray referring to God as merciful. With so much suffering in the world, some conclude “there is no god”. At Christmas the faithful believe in God, God who came as Jesus, born of the Virgin Mary, and who will suffer. Jesus will not only suffer under Pontius Pilate on the cross, but his whole ministry was also described as compassion or suffering with the people he met. By sharing pain, sharing infirmity, bearing grief, Jesus healed hearts and blessed them with hope.

I think there are two kinds of Christmas. There is the Christmas spirit with people happily decorating their homes, baking cookies, buying presents and feeling generous. We see Santa Claus in stores with children on their laps. People want to be Santa as well, and we see people wearing the red ‘Santa’ hat. Strangely some want to be reindeer and they sport antlers on their head. It is all fun, this ‘jolly, holly Christmas.’ This Christmas spirit is not trivial because it inspires generosity—donations to food pantries, Salvation Army Red Kettle Campaign, and winter clothing for the poor. At Frederick Place there is an outpouring of generosity for those temporarily without a home. Literally gifts have come in by the truckload. Praise God for the Christmas spirit.

But there is another part of Christmas I call the “Christmas soul”. The news of Christmas is good news for people who may look fine, but deep down they are carrying sadness and even despair. May the Christmas gospel reach such people in deep pain. Jesus came into this world not to encourage shopping but to lift the soul with the gift of love that is immeasurable. The Christmas message is summarized well by the apostle Paul in 2 Corinthians. He wrote, “For you know the generous act of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sake, he became poor, so that by his poverty you might become rich.” Again, God bless the Christmas spirit and enlarge it, so we reach out and touch with kindness and understanding someone who is sad. And God bless the Christmas soul: may the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ fill your soul with affirmation of worth and living hope.

Dear Northern Great Lakes Synod,

Have you ever ventured down the craft aisle of some do-it-yourself store? I remember being given a make your own sand art, make your own paint by number picture, and cross stitch kits with all the embroidery floss included. Maybe you graduated to the kits that brew your own beer or make your own birdhouse or nail together a raised garden bed.

I ordered a baker's rack once that required assembly. It was very handy to have step by step instructions paired with pictures and arrows, connecting part a to part b. Sure, I put it together wrong a few times before I got it right, but it now stands correctly assembled.

It was easy to begin these projects because I had a guide, instructions, I knew what the finished product was supposed to look like. Beginning was easy because the end was clear.

We know something about beginnings. We begin new jobs, new school years, move into a new house or apartment, welcome a new child, initiate a new ministry. Even without a kit, we know what it is to “start from scratch” when there are no pieces to put together, no foundation already laid, no past to shape the future, no ready-made mix that only needs eggs to make the cake.

Certainly, God didn't have much to work with “in the beginning.” God has a knack of how to make something from nothing. Such creative success takes a certain divine skill set. It is a God-only talent.

And yet, God shares God's own creative genius with us. And that is a good thing. Because we as congregations, we as the church, are at the beginning again. We need the creative spirit that only God can give because there are a host of things that are unclear.

Do we have all the pieces we need?

I say yes. I believe God provides the resources, the people, and the way forward for whatever God would have happen in and through your congregation.

Are we starting from scratch?

Not really. There is recent and a collective memory of the way things used to be, not only pre-pandemic, but pre-eighties. Whether these expectations, or even hopes, will be a help or a hindrance to new efforts remains to be seen.

Do we have clear instructions?

I say no. :) This is where we need the collective wisdom of the body of Christ listening intently to the Spirit and finding a way forward together. The goal is not to recreate the church of the past but to lean into the future church that is becoming. The Church is being transformed. Our job is to be faithful in this moment of history that will last years. Keeping the witness of Jesus of Nazareth as the lens through which all else is considered, we can't go far wrong.

Are we clear on what the finished product will be?

Maybe a little, but not really. The Church, capital C, is timeless. God will always call people to faith in Christ. The Spirit will always gather believers together. The Bible will always be treasured and provide an inspiring word to proclaim Christ. But what the Church looks like, how it sounds, where it gathers, the liturgy, traditions, music, language, rhythms, might all be reshaped and reformed. The wind of God is sweeping over the face of the Church. We may not be a formless void, but our shape is being re-formed, slowly but surely, and yet certainly faster than anyone is comfortable with.

As Congregations are investing energy into new or resurrected ministry efforts, we are beginning again in a new set of circumstances. It feels both familiar and foreign. It is both exciting and overwhelming, hopeful and anxious.

I pray God's blessings upon your efforts. You're not creating something from nothing, but I think it can feel like that.

God is with you, inspiring, energizing, and speaking the Word Christ into any darkness, saying, "Let there be...Church!"

Building confidence in the wake of disaster

Flooding is not uncommon in India, especially during the rainy season.

The city of Cuttack is bordered by the Mahanadi and Kathajodi rivers, so it often floods in the summer. But the flooding in 2022 was more severe than usual. When the waters swept through Surya Tudu’s house, she and her neighbors managed to move only some of their belongings to higher ground.

Surya is an Adivasi (Indigenous) woman and the mother of two small children. She used to be a domestic worker, but a broken leg forced her to stop working. Because Surya lost her main source of income, she didn’t have much money to buy food or supplies for her family after the floods.

Lutheran World Service India Trust (LWSIT), a longtime partner of Lutheran Disaster Response, reacts quickly to flooding, often prioritizing support for Dalit and Adivasi families like Surya’s.

Immediately after the flooding, Surya received food from the government, but it lasted only a few days. She and her family were among hundreds of families to receive food and hygiene supplies from LWSIT. The food lasted weeks, and the hygiene kits helped prevent waterborne illnesses, a common concern after major flooding. Other families also received tarps and additional materials to build temporary shelters after losing their homes.

Meeting minutes from September 13, 2023 were approved as printed.

Pastor/Ministry Report:

Pastor John continued the ministry to the nursing homes and shut-ins. The 2nd Tuesday of the month Pastor will be at Milestone Senior Care Center at 10am for services. This is an addition to his visits to Friendly Village on the 3rd Tuesday and Rennes on the 4th Tuesday of each month at 10am. Everyone is welcome to attend.

The funeral preparations for Fred McCue were discussed.

There will be confirmation and first communion celebration on Oct 29.

Pastor attended the meeting of the Rhinelander Ministry Association at St. Augustine. There will be a 7pm ecumenical service on November 22 for the community which is the evening before Thanksgiving. There will be a Blue Christmas ecumenical service there also on December 21 at 7pm.

Long Term Items:

1. Witness: Outreach to nursing homes has been expanded with the addition of Milestone to the visitation schedule.
2. Stewardship Sunday will be in November. The church committees need to review their finances and provide information for the 2024 budget.
3. Staff evaluations will be held at the end of the year.

Short-Term Items:

A. Old Business

1. No new information from the Call committee.
2. Facilities Update: A down payment to a contractor was made to have the roof fixed. The contractor needs temperatures in the 50's in order for the roofing to bond. Repairs will have to be put off until next year if there isn't warmer weather this fall. Heat tapes may be needed this winter to minimize snow build up in the areas to be repaired. Additional landscaping is planned for spring.
3. Answer the call raised \$506. Items were purchased and donated to the Personal Essentials Pantry hosted at the Methodist Church. This included the \$250 from Thrivent that was obtained by Glenn Johnson.
4. Immanuel Lutheran is now a member of the Rhinelander Chamber of Commerce. This provides a listing in their brochure with a link to our web site. Our bazaar should be listed under community activities.

B. New Business:

1. Fall Stewardship Emphasis: Time and talent sheets will be used, the same as last year. Talent sheets will be reviewed and lists prepared of those willing to help will be made and they will be contacted as the need arises. The prayer chain has been redone. Stewardship Sunday will be on November 12 with a brunch to follow.
2. There will be openings on the church council for 2024. Interested members can contact any of the church council for more information.
3. Christmas is on a Monday this year. There will be a Christmas Eve service on Sunday, December 24th at 4:30pm. This is in addition to the regular Sunday service at 9:00 am.
4. A list of the duties for opening and closing the church on Sunday has been prepared and is on the table in the room located to the left of the altar.

Meeting adjourned at 7:00 pm.

Did You Know?....

When we at Immanuel ask you to prepare an estimate of giving for the year, we have three categories to choose from: General Fund, Building Fund and Benevolence. On our envelopes, we have these three categories and the given amount is separated into the three different funds. The monthly financial summary shows the giving for each of the three funds and this is so you as the giver can choose where you believe your money is the most needed.

Now, let's think about Benevolence. The definition is goodness and kindness. This is a term that is kind of old. Perhaps a better term for our use would be Mission Support. When the Church Council presents the budget at the annual meeting, we have tried to determine how much our members will designate for Benevolence. This amount is then "pledged" to the Northern Great Lakes Synod and we pass on to them exactly what has been given. In the past, that amount has been about 10% of our total budget. Two years ago, we fell short of our pledge by about \$30.00. Last year we fell short by about \$600.00. The Council voted to use money from the Endowment Fund to make up the difference to meet our pledge.

What does the Synod do with our benevolence contribution? In 2021 \$784,220 was given by our Synod's 79 congregations. \$464,000 of Congregational Mission Support was passed on to ELCA Churchwide . The ELCA proclaims Christ through hunger relief, missionary efforts, disaster relief, leader training, and providing educational resources just to name some of the ELCA's many impacts. \$160,000 was shared with partners in ministry such as seminaries, ELCA church related colleges, campus ministries, Fortune Lake Lutheran Camp and the Wisconsin Council of Churches. \$80,000 was used within our synod for specific congregational ministries, outreach and hunger ministries. \$395,000 was used for Office Operations, Personnel and Administration. The synod office has 4 full-time staff: Bishop Finegan, Assistant to the Bishop Jim Duehring, Office Administrator Heather Oysti and Bookkeeper/Secretary Betsy Koski. There are 2 other part time positions: a Synod Missioner and a Synod Youth Ministries Coordinator. They are just a phone call or email away to serve 79 congregations both administratively and pastorally.

The reason that I am sharing about all that is done with our Benevolence giving is to highlight the importance of those dollars to our communities and the world. The Stewardship Committee has determined that we are again going to fall short of our pledge to the Synod this year by close to \$2,000. We are finding that since we have moved forward with our roof project, giving has shifted from Benevolence to the Building Fund. Since our shortfall will be so large, we don't feel that it would be right to make up the difference from endowment. We want to honor where you have chosen to commit your donations.

In conclusion, we are very grateful for the generous giving of this congregation and we realize that following 3 years of covid and the inflation in our country, our families are finding it more and more difficult to make ends meet. We are especially thankful that we basically have enough money to pay for the roof project without having to borrow money.
